This means that government targets will be met but even more importantly, we will strive to develop resilient, responsible, well-rounded individuals who are culturally inclusive, understand how they might contribute positively to the community and be well prepared for their future journey beyond our kura.

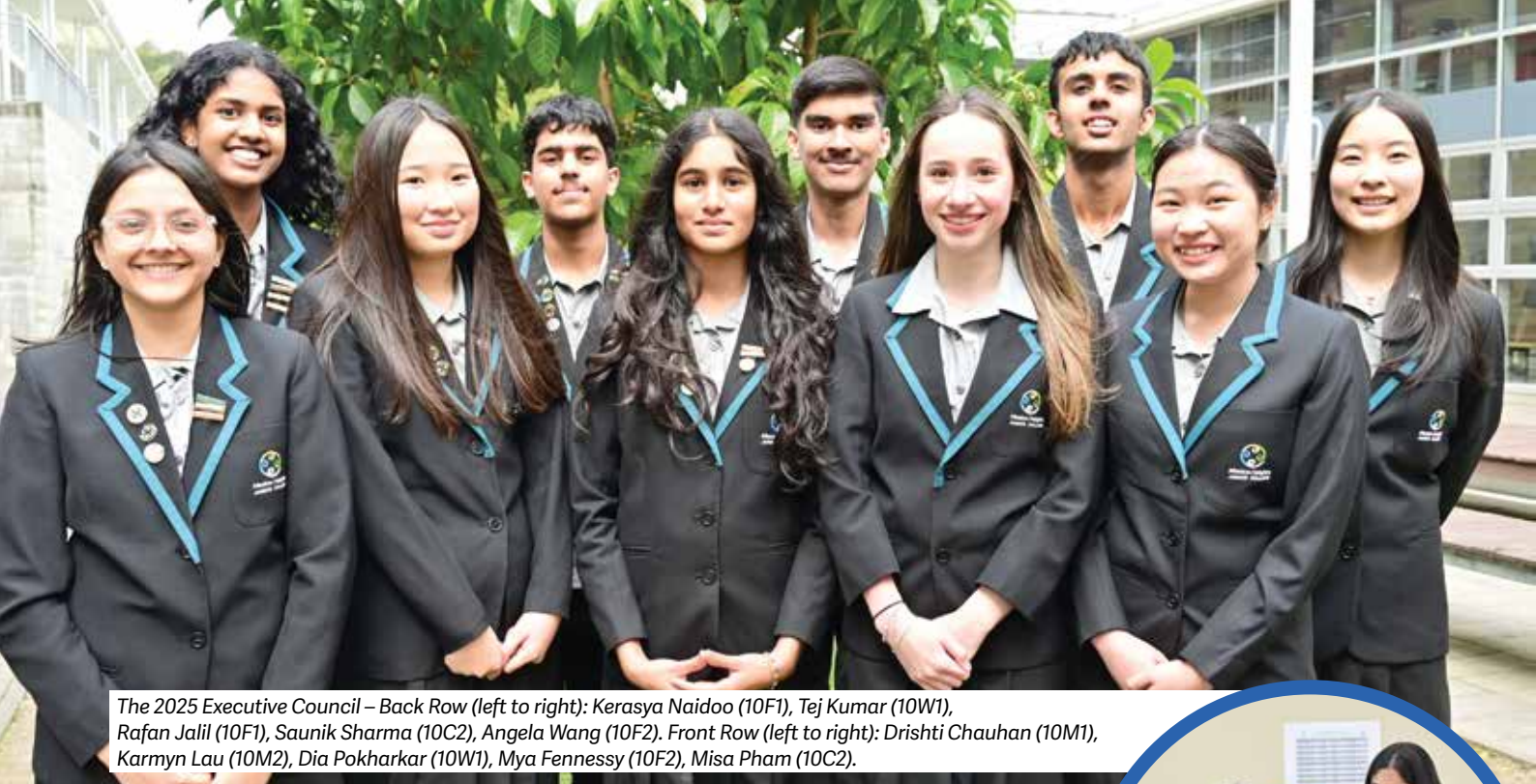

On the 16th of May, twelve MHJC delegates travelled to Singapore to attend the Hwa Chong Student Leaders' Summit.

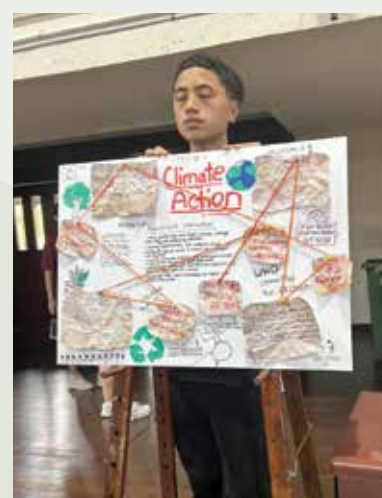

FIJI OUTREACH Programme

Vinaka Fiji! An Unforgettable Outreach Journey

"He aha te mea nui o te ao? He tāngata, he tāngata, he tāngata."

"What is the most important thing in the world? It is people, it is people, it is people."

As the final bell of Term 2 chimed, signalling the start of holidays, a buzz of excitement filled the air for ten fortunate delegates from our school. We weren't just heading home; we were embarking on an unforgettable journey to the breathtaking islands of Fiji. This wasn't an average school trip; it was an Outreach Programme, designed to immerse us in diverse environments, vibrant cultures, and connect us with incredible people.

Our Fijian adventure kicked off with a stop at the magnificent Nadi Temple. We wandered through its sacred halls gaining a fascinating insight into the Hindu faith. From there, we ventured into the heart of Fijian heritage at the Fiji Culture Village. We were greeted with a warm performance that transported us to a world of ancient traditions. A captivating tour followed, unveiling the secrets of Fijian culture, passed down through generations. We even got our hands dirty, molding clay, learning the art of weaving flax, and unleashing our competitive spirit in a hilarious game of "smash the coconut"!

The sun-drenched shores of Denarau Island beckoned us next. We indulged

in some retail therapy at Port Denarau, picking up souvenirs. The iconic Bula Bus became our chariot, ferrying us past luxurious resorts and showcasing the island's stunning scenery. Along the way, we made impromptu stops at charming roadside markets, sampling an array of tropical fruits and local snacks. Our quest for the legendary Fiji ice blocks led us through Sabeto, before our next adrenaline-pumping activity: the Sabeto Zipline. After our thrilling aerial adventure, a quick lunch fueled us for a picturesque 20-minute hike to a hidden waterfall.

The purpose of our trip began on the 4th day, as we headed to the Golden Age Home in Lautoka. We began by

sharing a heartfelt Waiata, introducing ourselves, and presenting the residents with thoughtful hamper packs. Then, it was time to roll up our sleeves. We diligently cleaned windows, polished tables, and cleared fallen leaves; transforming their living space into a brighter, more comfortable environment. More importantly, we sat and chatted with each resident, colouring with them, and listening to their stories. It was a humbling experience, giving us a firsthand look at the challenging conditions some elderly individuals face and highlighting the stark differences in living situations compared to what we know back home.

The following day brought a change of scenery. We journeyed to Sigatoka, arriving at Nadroga Arya College. Stepping into their classrooms, we gained a unique insight into the Fijian

education system. We bonded with students our age, exchanging stories about school life and sharing experiences. Later, we joined a Year 11 class for some gardening, helping to plant vegetables, water the beds, and clean up the garden plots.

Finally, we visited Nadroga Sangam Primary School to extend a warm "Kia ora" to the eager young students. We spent time chatting with them, sharing stories about our lives, and in turn, listening intently to theirs. We even had a bit of fun, testing them on their timestables and learning some new Fijian songs together. Our last act of service took us down a long highway for a roadside cleanup. We meticulously picked up bags and bags of rubbish, leaving the roadside significantly cleaner than we found it.

This Fiji Outreach Programme was an eye-opening experience. It allowed us

to witness firsthand the diverse living spaces and environments that exist beyond our own bubble. More importantly, it empowered us to make a tangible difference and create positive change in the communities we visited. We left our mark, not just on the landscape, but on the hearts of the people we met. We learned invaluable lessons, shared countless laughs, and created memories that will forever be etched in our minds. As we close this chapter, we carry with us a deeper understanding, a stronger sense of empathy, and a profound appreciation for the power of connection. The Year 9s had an unforgettable trip to Goat Island, where they learned to snorkel and explore the vibrant marine life. They saw schools of snapper, mao mao hiding in the kelp forests, and even shy eagle rays. They also visited the Goat Island Education Centre, where they learned about kina barrens and the vital role kelp forests play as nurseries for young fish. It was a perfect blend of hands-on learning and exciting marine exploration, making the trip a highlight of the year.

Another inspiring example of leadership came through the 40 Hour Challenge. Over 50 students took part by giving something up for 40 hours to raise money and awareness for families in the Solomon Islands affected by climate change. Together, our school raised an incredible \$3642. These funds will provide families with tools and seeds to grow climate-smart crops, ensuring they have reliable sources of food for the future. Mangroves will also be planted to protect gardens from rising sea levels and to attract fish back to the shore. Congratulations to Kerasya Naidoo (10F1), who raised an amazing \$675 on her own!

All students had the opportunity to participate in several non-uniform days throughout the year; each dedicated to

raising money for a worthy cause. Pink Shirt Day is always a highlight and it was great to see so many students get involved by wearing pink, spreading positive messages and taking part in the Colour Run. In Term 3, a group of Year 10 students showed initiative and creativity by organising a staff vs. students benchball game. This lively event brought our community together while raising money for UNICEF to support children affected by conflict around the world. It was a wonderful example of students using their passion to make a positive global impact.

We are also proud of those who dedicated time to programmes such as the Student Volunteer Army and Trees for Survival, extending their service beyond the school gates to make a difference in the wider community.

No matter the role, big or small, these acts of service shape the culture of our school and show that at MHJC, there is never a shortage of students willing to step up and lead. He waka eke noa!

'Academic Extension' is one of the four MHJC Cornerstones areas.

Academic Competitions

This year has been a remarkable one for our students in academic competitions. Across subjects and year levels, our learners showed curiosity, perseverance, and a real appetite for challenge. From spelling bees to Olympiads, the dedication of students and the support of teachers and whānau, made 2025 a year of both achievement and pride.

Term 2 Achievements

The year began with momentum, as students dived into Science, Technology, and English challenges. In the Big Science Competition, students achieved 13 Participation, 9 Credit, and 1 Distinction level awards.

Our mathematicians and coders also shone in the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) Competition, earning 3 Credits and 2 Distinctions.

The Great Kiwi Competitions once again attracted huge participation. In the English Competition, students gained 18 Achieved, 8 Merit, 6 Distinctions, and 1 Excellence. A similar number joined the Maths Competition, showcasing persistence and problem-solving skills. The Science Competition produced impressive results: 11 Achieved, 3 Merit, 1 Distinction, and a remarkable 10 Excellences.

Spelling talent was on display in the Aotearoa Spelling Bee for Years 9 and 10. Out of 39 entries, Jason Pham and Teresa Song advanced to the semi-finals. What a fantastic accomplishment!

Term 3 Achievements

By Term 3, attention turned to ICAS competitions. In Digital Technology, MHJC students gained 2 Distinctions, 1 Merit, and 5 Credits. English produced 8 Credits, 5 Merits, 2 Excellences, and a High Distinction for Year 8 student Anjali Mathew. Amazing results also came in ICAS Writing with 5 Distinctions, 2 Merits, and 6 Credits. ICAS Spelling produced 4 Distinctions and 4 Credits. ICAS Science and Maths both had incredible results too!

The Australian Mathematics Competition saw a record 75 participants from MHJC. This group had incredible results with 25 Credits, 27 Proficients, 9 Distinctions, and a High Distinction going to Claire Zhang. Three students took on the challenging Australian Informatics Olympiad, while 19 attempted the Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad. In the Great Kiwi Spelling Bee, 25 Year 7 and 8 students represented MHJC, with results pending.

EPRO8

Engineering skills were on display in the EPRO8 Challenge. Our first Year 9 team of Leon Qiu, Vihaan Chandwani, De'jon Nikolao, and Raymond Wang placed 3rd and qualified for the semi-finals. Hot on their heels, the second team of Ayaan Bhatia, Caramel Williams, Ryan Nguyen, and Saharsh Veerla secured 4th place. A brilliant effort from both groups.



Mathematics and Mathex

Mathematics remained a strength. Over 130 Year 7 and 8 students tackled the Junior Otago Problem-Solving Competition, while 40 senior students tested themselves in the Otago Mathematics Competition.

Our annual Mathex tournament is always a highlight, with teams competing from each Whānau. Congratulations to the following teams who won their respective year group categories.

Science Fair

In Science, more than 150 ākonga participated in the School Science Fair, with winners progressing to the South East Regional Fair. Their journey highlighted that Science is about curiosity, resilience, and the courage to keep asking "what if?"

TOURNAMENT *of Minds*

MHJC had four teams compete in the Tournament of Minds competition this year.

Students worked in groups for six weeks preparing for the competition. They created scripts, props, costumes, STEM models, and musical performances in order to respond to open-ended creative problem solving challenges. Three of our teams placed at the Regional Competition. Our Secondary Arts team placed 3rd, the Intermediate Language Literature team placed 2nd, and the Secondary STEM team placed 1st – meaning they travelled to Wellington in September to compete in the National Competition. At this National Competition, our team placed an impressive 3rd.
